There is no aspect of contemporary Russia that has changed more rapidly and unexpectedly than its economic situation. When Vladimir Putin became President, Russia was effectively bankrupt as it owed more money to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) than it had in foreign currency reserves.

Russia's participation in the G8 (now G-7) was suspended in March 2014 in response to its purported annexation of Crimea. Although Russia is not a member of NATO, NATO suspended all practical civilian and military cooperation with Russia as a result of Russia's 2014 actions in Ukraine; however, necessary political and military channels of communication between NATO and Russia remain open.
