The Discovery Programme has produced a detailed map of all of the monuments on the Hill of Tara using a combination of the geophysical survey finds and topography. The topography map is in digital format, which means it is fully interactive. It can be interrogated and manipulated in order to reveal features that are otherwise barely visible.

Most of the ancient features of the Hill of Tara (in archaeological terms, "monuments") are wholly or partially ring-like, but one is strikingly not. This is a long straight depression at the northern end of the Ráith na Senad that curves down between two parallel embankments with irregular breaks along their lines.

Several of the finds were high-status, imported objects from Roman Britain, dating mainly from the second to the fourth centuries A.D.
