What Is a Summary of the Iroquois Creation Story?

Iroquois Creation Myth, 1816. Many Indian peoples had and still have stories of creation that explain how they came to be and to live in their homelands. These narratives offer a glimpse into the belief systems present before Europeans entered North America. Many northeastern Indian peoples share a legend of how the world was created on the back of a giant sea turtle (some still refer to North America as a "turtle island").

Iroquois Creation Myth, 1816

This story comes from the Iroquois people in North America. In the 1400s they formed a federation of five separate tribes in what is now New York State. The Iroquois did not use writing, so

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they told this story orally until settlers from Europe wrote it down.

Through conquest and migration, the Iroquois gained control of most of the northeastern United States and eastern Canada. At its maximum in 1680, their empire extended west from the north shore of Chesapeake Bay through Kentucky to the junction of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.
